From the Dean's Pen ...

Dear Members and Friends of Trinity Cathedral,

Grace and Peace be with you from our risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

It is a year now that we mark the coronavirus pandemic and the closing down of our cathedral buildings, resulting in the inability to have in-person worship, social events, and ministry gatherings. In early 2020, after a shut-down of all but essential businesses countrywide in the initial three months, summer came with its warmth and a desire for things to re-open again. Unfortunately, we were unable to heed that desire. Positivity cases were rising along with the death rate, and the statistics alone told us things were not safe. The scientific and medical communities called for mask-wearing and distancing as essential for safety, not just for ourselves, but for others, especially the elderly and vulnerable. In the autumn and winter of 2020, hospitalization and mortality statistics continued to rise quite rapidly. In response, our Bishop directed that Episcopal churches would remain “virtual.” As with other mainline churches, the ethic of “love for one another” was our consistent message in keeping each other safe. This battle cry and banner continues today to be our message against the pandemic as it continues on.

We had hoped that Easter 2021 would be the magical time to re-open. But sadly it is not. Although there has been a welcome decline in positivity rates and deaths, we are still above the statistics of last spring when all was in shut down. In addition, we have the added dilemma of “foreign strains” and mutations of the virus that spread

more rapidly and are more deadly. We cannot let down our guard. As more become vaccinated, as hospitalization and death rates drop significantly, and when our medical and science communities offer assurance that we are indeed safe and protected, will we be able to consider opening up for in-person gatherings.



Before we can reopen for live services, the trend in COVID-19 cases must be on a continued downward path, the Cathedral must meet several physical and sanitation requirements, and the Diocesan Standing Committee must approve a reopening plan. To these ends, members of the Vestry (Jeannie Arps, Dr. Eloy Ituarte, and Margaret Zuccarini) and I reviewed challenges with reopening safely. We have staff and members, some with compromised health issues and have not received a vaccination, who are most nervous about in-person gatherings. Because our Cathedral building is under active renovation and our grounds are a construction site, any in-person gatherings would need to take place in the Parish Hall. Physically, the Parish Hall entrance inside and outside present challenges. First, there are physical safety issues with deteriorating concrete, and not-to-code steps, inclines, and railings. Sanitation procedures would need to be implemented. Most significantly, we only have the one entrance area. Using the Parish Hall building calls for more than one direct exit, and there is not enough space for proper distancing in the entryway. Accordingly, after a

I'm Giving Up Clutter for Lent

When Lent rolled around this year, it felt too soon. When did last year's Lent stop? We have been giving up so much since last March, it feels like we have been in a permanent state of Lent. So how *do* we "do" Lent this year, when ashes get blessed but not imposed, and Shrove Tuesday pancakes are shared via Zoom? For those who look for something to "give up" during Lent, are the usual suspects—chocolate, wine, desserts—an ethical choice when the economy needs our business in decadence?



I must confess to you that I didn't grow up in a family that gave things up for Lent. We went to church on Wednesday evenings for a full service, complete with sermon, had no flowers on the altar and didn't get married during the 40 days, but giving things up was Catholic, and we weren't going to go that route anymore than we were going to eat fish on Fridays. When I came home from my Lutheran parochial school one pre-Lent day and told my parents I was giving up ice cream for Lent, they were amused. They didn't stop me, but no one else in the family gave anything up, and when Easter rolled around and I had not had a lick of ice cream since Ash Wednesday, it was declared that I was a child with will power. Once that was established, giving something up for Lent wasn't so attractive anymore, since it was obvious I could do it if I put my mind to it. By the time I was a busy adult, giving something up seemed like one more thing to do, and the Lenten alternative, taking something up, was, well, one more thing to do.


Despite my personal history, I'm giving up clutter for Lent this year. This may seem a silly or trivial thing to you, but I'm deadly serious. The roots of clinging to clutter are many; for me it is about being perfect. However, whatever the cause, clutter of all kinds—physical, emotional, social—is a distraction. It keeps us from focusing on what matters. Back in the day, "giving up" was a should for me. However, Lent begins with "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." Anything which we give up for Lent should help us do that remembering. Clutter gets in the way of my doing that remembering. I put off clearing the clutter, telling myself that I have forever to deal with my piles and files of stuff. But I don't. I will die, sooner or later.

The business of Lent is to focus on the great gift of our salvation. That gift has meaning only in the face of our deaths, not as some sort of supplement to our accomplishments. So this Lent, I will purge away and let go of lots of unfinished tasks, remembering that life is short, too precious to waste on vain attempts to be perfect. As I do, I will rejoice in my salvation, grateful that I don't have to earn it.

Music Notes from Dr. Gordon

Lead Me to Calvary



On Saturday, February 20 members of the choir (along with Rev. Ruth) gathered for a taping of hymns and Taizé songs. The recordings will be used during our Zoom services on Sundays and the Thursday Lenten Taizé services, beginning on March 4th. We held a second recording session on Feb. 27. These special times were possible due to some restrictions being lifted throughout Nevada. I am relieved to see many of our folks faithfully getting vaccine shots and the number of cases continuing to decline. However, we will remain vigilant and agile in the coming weeks, in response to the Covid variants and follow the instructions of our diocese and state leaders. All members of the choir were invited to participate in the recording sessions, and I want to say a huge “Thank you!” to those who were willing and able to sing. In addition to the Saturday recordings, we are engaged in two virtual recording projects, which we look forward to sharing closer to Holy Week. We are recording the classic Samuel Wesley hymn “Lead Me, Lord” and also the gospel hymn “Lead Me to Calvary.”

I was 25 years old when I was first heard the hymn “Lead Me to Calvary” and ever since it has been a favorite part of my annual Lenten journey. If you’re unfamiliar with the hymn, I hope learning it will be as meaningful to you as it has been for me. It is such a poignant text to me because it addresses both our propensity for an experience of the cross that downplays the agony and suffering of our Lord and acknowledges that as humans we are “prone to wander from the God we love.” This kind of testimonial hymn is special in our vast catalog because it is sung by individuals directly to Christ. Therefore, I strongly encourage you to make this hymn text a part of your Lenten journey and take time to meditate on the verses often. If you do so, I promise the words will find a place in your heart and provide a deeper connection to the season.

Thine shall the glory be;

2. Show me the tomb where Thou wast laid,




**Cathedral Renovation Project Progresses**

The interior renovation of the Cathedral building began in early January. Before serious work could start, it was necessary to remove all of the tile in the space through an abatement process due to asbestos contamination in the glue used to apply the original tile. The insert picture shows a workman doing abatement. Outside, two air-conditioning compressors were installed on the east side of the building which will replace the old swamp cooler that provided cooling in the Nave. The chancel area is being brought to one level providing a more flexible space and improving access. Two additional new restrooms will be added on the sanctuary level, one of which will be ADA compliant. Look for monthly updates as the renovation moves forward!




ST. PAUL'S FOOD PANTRY

Vestry Minutes Summary, February 23, 2021

Financial Report



Vestry Notes

The meeting was conducted by Zoom Meeting and opened with prayer at 6:10 PM followed by reading of the Cathedral Mission Statement and individual blessings. The agenda was amended, and minutes of the January 23, 2021 regular meeting and February 2, 2021 special meeting were approved. **Treasurer report:** David Morgan, Treasurer, provided an in-depth review of the approved 2021 Operating Budget, January Operating and Statement of Financial Position as well as current status of the various restricted and unrestricted funds. **FFA Committee:** Terry Cain, Junior Warden, reported committee activities. Vestry approved recommended policies on Access to On-line Systems and Credit Card Authorizations. Vestry received the proposed Lay Employee Handbook with the request members review the document for approval at the March Vestry meeting. Vestry approved committee charters for Finance and Administration, Property, Human Resources, and Building Renovation. Jim Lamb,

Senior Warden, provided an update on the renovation of the Cathedral building. He noted vandals had thrown a rock which broke a piece in the stained-glass window above the river entrance door. Vestry voted purchase approval of audio equipment through Moon Lighting & Sound for installation in the renovated space at a cost of \$35,485.02. **Dean's report:** Father William reported there will be graveside services for Lucy Bouldin. He also reported on a parishioner who is currently hospitalized. Father William also noted preparation of the Parochial Report. Father William commented on the inability to implement in-person services due to space limitations and diocesan restrictions. There was discussion of the possibility of a virtual Vestry retreat. Father William reported on planning for Holy Week services. **Vestry:** Vestry voted approval of a resolution of appreciation for former Junior Warden, Lynne Charlat. The meeting adjourned at 8:34 PM. **Next meeting is scheduled for March 23, 2021 at 6 PM** via Zoom Meeting.

Trinity Committees Chartered

Trinity relies heavily on committees of parishioners to study and advise on many aspects of its operations supporting Trinity's mission. The Vestry has approved new or updated charters for four key committees:

- The *Finance and Administration Committee* which monitors the ongoing Trinity financial management and administrative operations and makes recommendations to the Vestry and Dean as appropriate;
- The *Property Committee* which oversees that the church buildings and grounds are well maintained and secure;
- The *Human Resources Committee*, a new committee, that advises the Dean, Wardens, and Vestry on matters related to personnel policies and management; and
- The *Building Renovation Committee*, a special committee, that oversees and makes recommendations on the renovation of the Cathedral building.



All these committees are comprised of both Vestry and non-Vestry members, and several vacancies currently exist. We will be looking for parishioners who might have skills, interests, and insights in all these areas to complement the work of these vital teams.

2021 Operating Budget**Calendar for Lent****2021 Trinity Operating Budget Approved**

Based on the results of Trinity's 2020 Stewardship Campaign, "Here I am, Lord," the Vestry approved an operating budget for 2021. To date, 203 pledges have been received totaling \$530,966, which is commendable, given the challenge of these times. (This compares to 221 pledges totaling \$606,513 made last year.) Despite the lower overall numbers, several bright spots emerged. There were 23 new pledges, and an additional 13 members who previously gave but did not pledge made a formal commitment to pledge this year. Sixty-three parishioners increased their pledges from the previous year; 75 pledged the same amount; while only 29 decreased their pledges for a variety of reasons.

As it considered the budget for this year, lower projected income — from pledges as well as from plate and other income — coupled with rising costs forced the Vestry to make some unwelcome and hard decisions, particularly with respect to personnel and the Diocesan assessment. The Vestry felt strongly that its financial support in ministries such as Christian education, on-line worship, and music should continue to be funded to the extent possible. It also reviewed all operational expenses and reduced them to the absolute minimum amounts needed.

Unfortunately, the approved budget contains no funding for cost-of-living or other salary adjustments for clergy or staff. The Vestry also regretfully decided that it could no longer continue employing a full-time sexton and will rely on a commercial cleaning service. Like all churches in the Diocese, Trinity pays a portion of its income to the Diocese of Nevada to support the Bishop's work as well as the policy and advisory functions of the Diocese. Given Trinity's financial constraints, the approved budget reduces the amount of this assessment significantly.

The approved budget after some technical adjustments projects a deficit of about \$133,000. However, in 2020 Trinity received \$78,800 in the first phase of the Federal Payroll Protection Plan. When this loan is forgiven as anticipated in the coming weeks, these funds will be used to offset this deficit.

The clergy, wardens, vestry, and staff thank all our members for their faithful giving during these difficult days. Although the church buildings remain temporarily closed to in-person gatherings for worship and programs, we are grateful that our ministries continue to function and grow and have optimism for the coming months.


