From the Dean's Pen ...

Dear Friends and Family of Trinity Cathedral,

Grace and Peace to you from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

There is a prayer that is often prayed by the Cistercian monks at Compline that contains these lines from Psalm 91:

You will not fear the terror of the night,
nor the arrow that flies by day, nor the
plague that prowls in the darkness, nor
the scourge that lays waste at noon."

Cistercians, also known as Trappists (creators of Trappist jellies and preserves, as well as "Monks Bread" in the Washington D.C. area), is a contemplative religious order. Their monastic life is characterized by work, silence and prayer in obedience to an exacting interpretation of the six-century *Rule of St. Benedict* for monasteries. They live in a community behind the enclosure of monastic walls, separated from the world. With these days of distancing I am reminded of my experience of living in such a Cistercian community in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia for a month while I was a seminarian. (This particular community originally was a dairy farm – lots of fenced in acreage with cows and barns converted to a modern bakery.)

With Covid-19, many of us are living, in a way, like monks, enclosed and isolated in our homes. But

unlike the monks, we did not ask for or want this situation, nor is it one for which many of us were spiritually prepared. It is, however, a situation from which we can perhaps learn something by turning to monks for guidance, for they do have a lot to teach us as individuals and families during this time in quarantine.



We are all very much aware that our society revolves around the notion that power and wealth give meaning to our existence, which in turns gives us a sense of control. This thinking alone creates an illusion of meaning and purpose which undermines our spiritual growth and living. What we have done is closed the door to grace. We scurry about consumed by the busyness of life. However, the pandemic reminds us of our mortality and fragility, urging us to rethink our priorities.

Quarantine can lead us inward, and if we allow it, there is a chance to overcome fear of solitude and find actual comfort in being something that transcends our present life styles. With this we begin to realize the importance and significance of community, because we are learning humility. Humility is making room for another in creating a climate of love and caring. As such, with others we become more attentive to listening and caring, realizing our happiness is about living in communion with those with whom our lives are naturally

intertwined. Realizing we are one, despite our blemishes, is the ground by which we build community.

In an April 22 article by Gregory Hillis entitled "We Are All Monks Now," Father Casagram of the Abbey of Gethsemani in Kentucky, is quoted as saying: This (time of isolation) is "a great opportunity to yield control of our lives, to let ourselves truly trust in the goodness and providence of God amidst all that is happening."

Whether we are aware of it or not, we are "living in the presence of a living, caring and loving God," and we can use this time of quarantine to develop, alone or with those with whom we live, a sense of this divine presence.

We continue to hold up one another in prayer during these days of social distancing.

When will in-person worship take place? What will it look like?

These are questions we all continue to ask as we are all anxious to be back in worship and fellowship. As we continue to miss one another and want to shed the yoke of isolation and social distancing, we realize that patience is still the biggest requirement we must ask of ourselves. The questions cannot be answered readily or easily because we realize that "when the time comes" (and I am confident it will come, but when is the unknown), there will be a "new normal" for us to follow for some time. Worship will still follow the same structure and format that is a given with our Book of Common Prayer. How one "does" some of the actions of liturgy is what will need altering. Do we sit in every other row and six feet apart in the same row? These are unknowns at this point but probabilities. We continue to follow the rules and procedures set by our Nevada state government and know that things will be re-evaluated in mid-May. We also have to anticipate the guidance we will receive from our national Episcopal Church and the diocesan bishop. What I can share is this:

- When it is time to return in the next month or so, we will gather in the Parish Hall for worship because construction work will have begun in the cathedral space. We can expect there will be requirements for masks and social distancing.
- We know that the passing of the Peace will involve a bow to each other rather than hand shakes and hugging.
- We know that we will not be passing offering plates—too many hands would be touching them. Rather, during the offertory hymn we will process to the Altar and place our offerings into a basket. The gifts of bread and wine will follow in procession to the Altar.
- We know that the serving of Communion will eliminate "handling of vessels and elements" so that the "full intinction sets" will be carried by one or two priests for distribution. This consists of each priest carrying a small tray with a container of wafers and a cup of wine, and a purificator linen. (Gluten free wafers, a fifth item, cannot be offered; one who touches wheat wafers cannot be touching a gluten free wafer also.) We can only offer Communion with two species in this manner, but you are also encouraged to just take a wafer which the Church has historically proclaimed as still "full communion." Coming forth simply for a blessing, abstaining from taking bread and/or wine in this context is also "communion in spirit."
- Whether or not we can have coffee hour after services is an unknown at this time.

Dear Members of Trinity,

On May 1, 2020, I begin my call as the Canon for Parish Life here at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral. I began worshipping at Trinity in Advent of 2006 and began preaching here in 2012, so I am not really a “new hire,” nevertheless, a fuller introduction of me is in order.

I’m a native of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and except for a two-year stint in Storm Lake, Iowa, I spent my early years in Council Bluffs with my parents and four siblings. Our family business was Hanusa Co., a “heavy” hardware, plumbing and heating store. After high school I earned my A.A. at St. John’s College in Winfield, Kansas, and then graduated with a B.A. in theology from Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana. I earned my M.Div. at Christ Seminary—Seminox, St. Louis, Missouri, which was a break-away school from the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, the church body in which I grew up. I was one of only two women in my seminary graduating class of seventy-six. Years later, I earned an M.A. in English Literature from UNR.

My pastoral career has included calls as Protestant campus minister at both UNLV and UNR, and as co-pastor, associate pastor, and interim pastor at parishes too numerous to name. I have taught community college in the Nevada prison system, served on many church boards and committees, and done “supply” preaching and presiding in Nevada, California and North

Dakota. In 2006 I became a hospice chaplain for Saint Mary’s Hospice in Reno, and since 2018 I have been the Bereavement Coordinator as well as a chaplain.



I have three children and three grandchildren. Son Benjamin and his wife Gabby live in Reno with their daughter Tz’Porah. Daughter Rachel and her husband Jacob live in Renton, Washington, with their children Yoey and Silvia. Son Jon and his wife Sarah moved to Seattle on March 1 of this year. I live with two cats, Bella and Emma, and a Roomba named The Lieutenant Colonel.

I am more than excited to be called as a priest to serve Trinity. While all the details are still being worked out I will have major responsibilities in the areas of pastoral care and education, as well as preaching and leading worship. I am an extravert and get my energy being with people, so these days of physical separation do not please me. Nevertheless, I will do what I can to begin to get better acquainted with you, and long for the day when we can do it face to face.

Sack Lunch News

Greetings to all. Here are some of our changes. We have moved upstairs in the Parish Hall, ensuring the process for the handing out of lunches greatly simplified and far more controllable. We had tried a variety of methods when downstairs, including a roped off area for food distribution but being upstairs is far better. March showed an increase of 10% in lunches given out. We see many new faces coming for food and many of them young ladies. Future months promise the same.



Howard Bennett does an incredible job finding many supplies but since we are so limited in purchasing food, we rely on individuals supplementing items. We seem to continually run short of Vienna Sausage so any donations of those are always welcomed. Volunteers in the program, choir members and others assisted with a very successful water drive in March.

Our contact at Catholic Charities of Northern Nevada, made through the Truckee River Choir for Homeless, gave us a whole pallet of Minute Maid Cranberry juice. Many Trinity church members have been scrambling and donating too. Helen Heller sewed masks for our volunteers as did a visitor from the 9:00 a.m. service.

Safety concerns led to the volunteer schedule being reduced to two volunteers per shift in lieu of three. The primary goal, to reduce exposure for all volunteers. After mutual agreement, older at-risk volunteers and those medically in a high-risk category were removed from the schedule. Other volunteers are scheduled one shift per month with the exception of our dedicated leaders.

One thing we never fall short of is the message of love and caring given out with every lunch. The constant appreciation we receive back so touches our hearts.

The Trinity KIVA Investment Portfolio

The portfolio has recently been reevaluated and has been updated to reflect Trinity's account balance of \$1,258.31.

Background: KIVA is a 501 (c)(3) Non-Profit Organization that allows people to lend via the internet to low-income entrepreneurs and students in 77 countries. KIVA's mission is "to expand financial access to help underserved communities thrive."



Historically, Trinity has lent \$10,775 to applicants in 36 countries since 2012.

Trinity's Status as of March 18, 2020, was \$1,258.31, meaning that Trinity was entitled to 'lend' this cash balance. At that time, Trinity's Portfolio reported \$161.83 in outstanding loans with a net loss of \$51.97.

Trinity's Investment Portfolio is part of a 'Field Group' entitled: *Episcopal Church of the United States* that historically has been responsible for 34,000 loans and includes 577 Members, mainly individuals. Trinity's activity as of March 18, 2020, included loaning \$9,965 of which \$9,021 has been repaid. Additional historical detail includes:

Distribution to 59% Female; 41% Male recipients
Locations balance: 20.45% Philippines; 12.5% Kenya
Sectors: 31.82% Retail; 26.14% Agriculture; 25% Food

Since March, Trinity has invested in 15 enterprises across the globe ranging from pig fattening/cattle (4); farming/agriculture (3); retail (6); health (1); services/3-D printing: prostheses (1). Countries in which Trinity has invested include: USA (2); Tajikistan; Rwanda; Kenya (2); Thailand; Guatemala; Honduras; Philippines; Jordan; Cambodia; & El Salvador.

The primary decision-making factor in Trinity's investing since March 2020 has been based on the adage: 'Give a man a fish and he will eat today, but teach a man to fish and he will eat forever'. Therefore, nearly all of Trinity's loans have been made to enterprises that suggest the potential of individual independence.

Sanctuary Renovation Update

In anticipation of dust soon beginning to fly, a flurry of activity has begun to prepare us for exciting changes that are about to begin. We are actively engaged in securing bids from three highly qualified companies to completely dismantle and remove our treasured 37-rank Frères Casavant organ to safe keeping during the construction period.

A "Move Team" has been established, and the members include your Wardens along with Fr. William, Terry Cain, Harold and Lindsay Campbell, Dave Chute and Julie Demler. Dave Chute will be calling upon his Ministry of Service volunteers to work in teams to prepare for and accomplish our move from the Sanctuary and Crypt into the Parish Hall.

Who knew a portion of the stage would be transformed into an office space and Music Library for our yet-to-be-named new Organist/Choir Director?! Our young ones will find their Sunday School rooms stocked with all their needed learning and art supplies, and our Altar Guild will install a temporary Sacristy on the stage area.

Our Sack Lunch program has already been relocated upstairs in the Parish Hall, and our Baby Bundles, Knitting, and other ministries will be able to find all their supplies in their half of the newly divided conference Room B. We will be very mindful of taking all the necessary personal precautions of limiting the number of volunteers in any area at any given time, social distancing, hand washing, along with mask and glove wearing to keep our community safe.

2020 Census

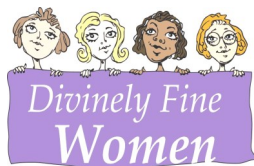

Vestry and Finance Reports

April 20th Vestry Summary

The meeting was conducted by video conference and opened with prayer at 6:05 p.m. followed by reading of the Cathedral Mission Statement and shared blessings.



Vestry Notes

The agenda (with adjustments), minutes of the March 16 Vestry meeting, and March Financial Report were approved or accepted. The **Treasurer** noted a shift in offerings with use of online contributions and mailing in of offerings. The **FFA Committee Report**: Lynne Charlat reported The Rev. Ruth Hanusa has been called as an Associate Priest effective May 1 as the Canon for Parish Life. The committee continues to research clergy and staff health insurance options. The Vestry approved the committee's recommendation to contract with consultant to convert existing website to a new platform to include changes in method for receiving donations. Vestry approved committee recommended policy regarding in-kind gifts. Vestry approved committee recommendation for Cathedral to apply for the Federal Government Payment Protection Program as recommended by the Bishop. FFA will monitor Cathedral financial situation and encourage parishioner support. **Ministry Reports**: The Dean reported that Rev. Dunfee has continued her nightly reading program for children. He also reported the Episcopal 101 class continues through the use of Zoom video technology. **Property Committee**: Lynne Charlat reported Dianda Construction is completing the bid process and start of renovation could begin perhaps by mid-May. Removal and appropriate storage of the organ pipes is necessary prior to start of construction.

The **Dean** reported Palm Sunday, Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday services went well with live streaming. He noted receipt of compliments from parishioners and other in the diocese. The Dean commented on a number of deaths (non-COVID-19 related) in the parish. However, the virus has delayed any services. Those services will be scheduled or addressed when possible. Effected families are included in the parish Prayer List. The Dean reported the Clergy Rota for May is complete and distributed. Live streaming and recording of Thursday and Sunday services will continue. He also commented that he and the wardens are discussing how to move forward when the Stay-in-Place order is lifted. The Dean reported that Cathedral clergy will continue the "Pray, Think, Do" daily devotional. **Vestry**: Vestry members will continue making phone calls to fellow parishioners. Margaret Zuccarini provided an overview of the KIVA program. The mission statement of KIVA is "to connect people through lending to alleviate poverty." Trinity recently made 15 investments with KIVA funds (\$1,258.31) to enable individuals to build businesses worldwide that will help them become independent. **Old Business**: Lynne Charlat reported on the construction project taking place on the adjacent property. **New Business**: Vestry approved engaging Stewart Campbell to continue live streaming services through July 31, if needed. Vestry discussed ways to engage parishioners during this time of extended isolation through the use technology and other methods. Vestry agreed that maintaining two-way contact and conversations are especially important to our community. The next Vestry meeting is May 18 at 6:00 p.m.
